

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Step Nine:

"Made direct amends to such people whenever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others."

As I think about the 9th step of AA I realize I am doing it right this minute. AA's promise is restoration. That is a healing beyond any I could have imagined. But how do I do step nine? If step nine is in a series of steps, which will introduce me to God and a spiritual awakening, and very nature of this awakening sets me entirely free, how do I begin when I've caused so much harm? If I am willing what do I do? First of all with out a sponsor I would have surly languished in my own thinking on this, which has never done the job in the past so sponsor is a must. Secondly to understand step nine was a looking back affair. I only need to get to it, with a sponsor, and make a beginning. It is my experience that I made some amends and they were done at that point and others are on going...not to scare anyone. This is all one day, each day, the best I can. Our best is good enough. We must give this a rigorous effort to get the results promised. I was told early on the promises are real but the rooms are littered with miserable alcoholics who half measured it. I was told it was very important to stay away from people who had

untreated alcoholism and to pick people who were doing the deal.

When I got sober in 1991 my sponsor had me write amends I was willing to make right away, amends in the near future, amends in the far future and amends I would never make. As I started the journey of restoration I found as I began with the first bunch of people, the people in the near future moved to the willing to do right away and so on until the never people ended up doable. Now this is over a long stretch of sobriety and proof that we live this way of life. Over and over like I drank over and over. This time I'm getting a really great result although it sometimes doesn't feel good. Now back to my gift in black paper wrapping. I met this person in 1980. This is a long relationship over 30 years and family at that. Those are the juiciest kind my sponsor informed and the most healing. I was 18 and she was 12 years old. My drinking affected all areas of her life. Her father is my husband today and my best friend. Back then it was the house of crazy. At first, I said to my sponsor, I'd do this amends. I felt she had harmed me maybe not as much because she was a kid but darn it she hurt me too! So no big deal ha! My sponsor gently instructed me that this was only about harms I did others. Then we discussed harm and what it meant. Shocked I went in

the opposite direction. I was horrible because I harmed a child. Without letting me off the hook she explained I was but a child as well and we look at the situation under the eyes of truth. (See you need a sponsor). I still had plenty amends but they were not minimized, rationalized or magnified. My first attempt at restitution in this relationship was a simple face-to-face acknowledgement of wrongdoing and a heart felt admission of caring about that. I personally think, an I'm sorry for the way I treated you, face to face, is underrated in AA. Of coarse if not followed by an effort to set right the harm as much as possible it means little. Those first admissions were huge in helping me to accept responsibility for my actions. Then when I was eight years sober my husband's daughter needed help. I was sober, strong and had the resources' to help. I did so with gusto, maybe a little too much gusto. She came into AA. I envisioned us all becoming happy, joyous and free. That ended very badly. I took inventory after Rome stopped burning and saw the whole picture with new eyes. I was pushing, even though my motives were good. I was trying to make it happen i.e.; running the show bottom of pg. 60 and the whole of pg. 61 in the big book. I also saw through the inventory steps that I desperately wanted her to get sober so I

CLEANING HOUSE

After a prolonged period of unemployment, I realized that work in my regular profession would not be forthcoming. I had to get creative and figure out a way to generate income. So, I made up a few house-keeping flyers and I put one up at a local business. Just on flyer—I was fearful. I had cleaned house for friends and family, and I was good at it, and attentive, but I had never cleaned for strangers.

Some time passed without any calls. Then, much to my amazement, I got a telephone call from that one flyer; a gentleman needed his condominium cleaned. After we spoke, I

breeze promising a mild January. We sat down and Linda told me her story. A miracle was happening before me. Linda was such a beautiful woman, glowing in her sobriety, her resurrection from the dead. It was difficult to imagine her drunk and participating in all the debauchery that follows.

She had been sober for four months, but had relapsed. The day we met she had eight days of sobriety, and she had almost died during her relapse. She grasped my hand and told me that she did not think she could survive another relapse. I told her that for sure she would not survive, as evidenced by the fact that her Higher Power had sent her a personal

got the impression that I had totally blown my opportunity, that I had said something wrong. However, I did not dwell on it; I let it go and left it to God's providence. Much to my surprise, the man called me back, and we scheduled a time for cleaning.

I was excited, but also terribly nervous about walking into a stranger's home. I worried I might damage something or break something. I understood, however, that I must trust my Higher Power. I had specifically begun to pray for employment, and here was a job. God was surely in the mix.

I arrived at the scheduled time and met the man, Ken, messenger in the form of a cleaning lady to confirm her greatest fear. The first truth I understood in AA was that for us, to drink is to die. I have lived by this truth.

I also told Linda that I was a bit envious. So far, God has never sent anyone to my front door with a message, someone who also cleaned toilets, for goodness sake!

I asked Linda to share her story at a meeting. At first she was reluctant, but then she agreed to tell her story to our group. We can try to keep the message out, but our Higher Power will find a way to carry it. Recovery depends upon AA unity.

Together we live; apart from each other we shall surely die.

and his friend, Linda, who lived there as well. Right off, we felt at ease with one another, so Ken and Linda went off to enjoy their day.

I went into their bedroom to begin dusting the blinds, and there on the dresser, much to my delight, was the Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, along with As Bill Sees It. I was relieved to be among friends—but the miracle was still unfolding.



TIPS ON WORKING STEP NINE

1. *Good judgment, a careful sense of timing, courage and prudence—these are the qualities we shall need.*
2. *People would rather see a sermon than hear a sermon.*
3. *Do not do this step without a sponsor.*

IT'S NOT THE SHOELACE!

Recently, my home group conducted a workshop exploring emotional sobriety. We broke it up into different aspects such as "What is emotional sobriety?" "How does it differ from physical sobriety?", etc. My assignment was to explore: "Why we need emotional sobriety and I presented it as follows: When I first came to AA my emotions rose to the surface where I became aware of them. While I thought that I had successfully submerged them with alcohol when I was drinking, I can't deny that I often drank at "him", "her", "Mom", "Dad", the boss, some unfair customer, a disrespectful sales clerk, not feel, but the truth is that I felt everything and often wanted to show "them". I used drinking to hurt others or plot my revenge. My immaturity came out in full force. My old idea was that alcohol would still work with these feelings, and I would sometimes give in. Even if I didn't drink, I could be miserable and hold grudges. That's when something trivial lead me to drink because it was the last straw. Without the help of God and a sponsor, I might never know that

it wasn't the shoelace but the lingering grudge and my lack of emotional sobriety that led to drinking again. While this lack of emotional sobriety was dangerous when I was newly sober, the danger did not go away just because I've achieved some time in AA. Indeed, I can mistake number of years for a degree of emotional sobriety. I can rest on my laurels without even recognizing it. When I hold on to resentments, when I find things unforgivable, when I am jealous of another's success, when I am unwilling to listen to others and change my mind, when I react severely to criticism even as I congratulate myself for another day or month or year of not drinking, I am not only emotionally sober but I also may become not physically sober. This can happen even if I once had a spiritual awakening and have many years of sobriety behind me. The Tenth Step tells me to "watch for selfishness, dishonesty, resentment and fear" not because these emotions are so deadly in themselves, but because they block me from dealing in a mature, emotionally sober way, rather than just reacting. Since the es-

say on the Step next says, "and when they crop up", it is a sure bet that time in the program will not make me immune from these negative emotions. My reactions can include drinking again, but even if I don't drink, I can cause problems and heartache in the lives of those who love me and work with me. As the book says, "We believe a man who says sobriety is enough is unthinking". For the sake of others if not for myself, I should seek emotional sobriety. When I am letting myself be ruled by "selfishness, dishonesty

, resentment and fear", any rational thinking or action I do would be purely by accident. Likewise, serenity would be elusive at best and non-existent at worst. As a friend says, my biggest job in a spiritual life is to become undisturbed. I would only have one of two reactions to any negative interaction with another person: I would either forgive the other person or make amends. I have made a real advance in emotional sobriety if I finally realize I do not have to react to a slight by striking back. Finally, I was told to live one day at a time but not told how to do that. I submit that it is impossible to do a day at a time when bedeviled by emotional chaos. If I strive for emotional sobriety, I will have a much better chance of living in the now, which can lead to joy and appreciation for the wonder of my life.

wouldn't feel guilty. Then I knew what they were saying when they said. " Guilt is B.S. " It causes more harm. Also I understood the "wherever possible" part in the ninth step not come hell or high water! Get sober I cried! In interest of completeness I truly realized how fatal this illness is and so wanted my husband to have his daughter in his life and for her not to die. She is back in AA over 1-1/2 years now. I was able to be there again with all my resources and there are many more. I've acquired so much strength, grace and power in these last thirteen years. We thought she was going to die. But she lives. I see the sparkle I was trying to force. The real grace as it shines through her eyes. I see my husband cry tears of joy that she is restored. We must give it away to keep it and continue to live these principles, which are the steps. Principles that had to be spelled out for a self-centered alcoholic like me. So the ninth step is at the bottom of the batting order, it's the clean up step. As we

put this new way of living into our lives through action and by choice, the miracle of choice less awareness becomes a reality and we are just in Gods grace... free. Then it's just a matter of God shows up. So the ninth step is the clean-up step. So clean your house it's dirty...live clean it feels great! Do it every day and then you find that you can't live any other way for you are restored any time you live in principle.

"AA as such ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve."

Our board and committees are just simply responsible to those they serve. There are no big shots, There are no little shots, One shot we are

all shot. When I approach service in AA it is a spiritual endeavor. I find the good is the enemy of the best as Bill writes. I feel when AA members as myself understand the traditions a wonderful lightness and joy prevail. Then tradition. 9's, boards and committees are just directly responsible to those they serve, they aren't organized by a human leader, and are better because God guides them. The rule is unless each AA member follows to the BEST of his ability our suggested 12 steps of recovery, HE almost certainly signs his own death warrant. Bill W. is clear and to drink is to die. Bill W. goes on to say. The AA members drunkenness and dissolution are not penalties inflicted by people in authority; they result from his personal disobedience to spiritual principles. Step 9 says oh so powerfully to me that there is a difference in the spirit of vested authority and the spirit of service , two concepts which are sometimes poles apart.
